COLÁISTE ÁCLA

Roinn na Gaeilge in conjunction with the Physical Education Department organised a four day trip to Coláiste Ácla from 8th-11thMay for our Second Year students to improve their linguistic skills in our native tongue and to help promote the language as a living one among the school cohort. IMMERSION PROJECT

Mr. Whitty and Mr. Gannon are proposing to run another Immersion Project with the intention of travelling to Zambia in June 2019. A considerable number of students expressed an interest in getting involved and since places on the Project are limited, interviews were held to determine those who will participate. The students and teachers involved will be actively engaged in fundraising for the next year in particular. All the funds raised for the Project will used to help complete the Sables Centre which helps orphaned and vulnerable children. The Sables Centre provides food, shelter, education and counselling for these at risk children and aims to eventually integrate them into the normal education system. Whilst in Kawbe, the group will also engage in home visits, hospice visits and help in the classrooms to educate the children. The project has always been a huge success and the communities visited have greatly appreciated the work and kindness of the students and teachers.

STUDENTS' COUNCIL

I would like to thank the Students' Council for its contribution to school affairs during the last year. I would like, in particular, to thank Abdullah Azam (chairperson) and the other Sixth Year members of the

Council who will be leaving us this year for their efforts on behalf of the student body. The Council was represented at Comhairle Na nÓg and at the E.R.S.T. training day for Students' Council members.

SCHOOL REDEVELOPMENT

Monday 16th February 2018 was a historic day for all in the school community as we began our first day in the newly developed school. Staff, students and parents have expressed their delight with the new spacious building.

Phase 1 saw the commencement of enabling works, the construction of a new gym and the provision of temporary accommodation. This was completed by June 2016.

Phase 2 saw the construction of a link building joining up more modern separate blocks of the existing school and the construction of a computer room and language laboratory. This was completed by September 2016.

Phase 3 consisted of the decanting from the old school into the temporary accommodation, the demolition of the old school and the construction of a new state of the art facility comprising seventeen classrooms, three science labs, a library, an ASD Unit, group rooms, a staff room, offices and stores. The GP room was renovated and existing classrooms were renovated and reconfigured to provide a music room and a lecture hall which can be also used as classrooms. This was completed in February 2018.

Phase 4 will involve the development of a playing pitch later in the calendar year when the temporary accommodation is removed from its current location. This phase of the project is currently on hold while the CBS Primary school is located in the temporary accommodation formerly occupied by the secondary school.

INSTRUCTIONAL LEADERSHIP

Ms C. O'Brien, Ms S. Breen, Ms Ruth Ivers, Mrs H. Turner, Mr F. Davey and Mr D. Howlin are currently taking part in an Instructional Leadership Programme run by Professor Barrie Bennett in conjunction with the ETBI.

WSE-MLL FOLLOW UP INSPECTION

The school received a very positive evaluation from the Department of Education Inspectorate during the recent WSE-MLL Follow Up Inspection. The purpose of the inspection was to evaluate progress made on the recommendations arising out of the WSE-MLL (Whole School Evaluation-Management, Leadership and Learning) held in November 2014. Both reports are available on the school website (<u>www.wexfordcbs.ie</u>) or on the DES website (<u>www.education.gov.ie</u>). Much work had gone on in the interim in implementing the recommendations in the 2014 Report to further enhance the quality of educational provision in the school and it was great to see this recognised in the Report.

VOLUNTARY CONTRIBUTIONS

Given the cutbacks in funding for education, parents' contributions are as important as ever. Higher insurance, electricity and heating bills over the last number of years mean that it will be harder to pay the school's bills next year. Many other additional costs arose in the past few years due to the redevelopment work such as the decanting costs. I would like to thank those who have given generously this year and I would appeal to all parents to make an extra effort next year to contribute to the voluntary contribution at the beginning of the new school year. Your financial contributions are greatly appreciated. As outlined above, we hope to install a pitch to complete the school redevelopment and all costs of same will also have to be borne by the school.

TRANSITION YEAR

There will be four Transition Year classes next year, each with twenty four students. The Transition Year programme which will provide the students involved with many educational challenges both within and beyond the school walls.

Coláiste Éamonn Rís China Trip 2018-A Diary

On March 13th 2018, 30 students and 3 teachers boarded Flight EY42 on Etihad Airways bound for Beijing via Abu Dhabi. A trip of a lifetime waited. The students had all participated in a Chinese Studies Module before departure, giving them some sense of what was in store. Equipped with some useful phrases, knowledge of some geography and history of China and a huge curiosity as to how a country with such a vast population actually functions, we landed in Beijing early on the morning of 14th March. Our initial impression was the WOW factor, as Chinese writing seemed to be everywhere, we were definitely in China. It was a grey morning with an invisible sun high in the sky. This was what we had heard about, smog. Your nose and mouth sensed it was very different from home. People with masks on were common. Yes this was China.

Our itinerary was full and varied. After our arrival we were taken to a restaurant for lunch. Working with chopsticks was a great experience. A skill you mastered or went hungry. The food was all we expected-full of luscious aromas, crunchy colourful vegetables and chicken and pork in wonderful sauces.



Day 1


It began in **Beijing's 798 Art Zone**, comprising of a complex of 50-year-old decommissioned military factory buildings boasting a unique architectural style, located in Dashanzi, Chaoyang District of Beijing, that houses a thriving artistic community.

Tiredness was setting in as we got our evening meal, again sitting at tables of 11. We conversed about the food, the journey and the idea of actually being able to sleep in a bed. The routine of eating remained the same for the duration of the trip, varied company and conversations at the table and varied menus to spice up the palate.

We checked into our hotel, situated on the North West corner of the second ring road. We were never so glad to get horizontal. Lights out and the longest day was over.

Day 2

The next day began early as we headed to **The Great Wall**. Very impressive. From there we had lunch, went to a **Tea Ceremony** were we tasted many varieties of tea. No milk, no sugar needed. Next we went to enjoy the **Olympic Village** built for the 2008 Olympic Games. The Birds Nest and The Cube. We then went to the **Houhai Lakes** and surrounding hutong of **Nanluoguxiang** were we saw the traditional housing from early Beijing. More food and back to base to chill out and again try catch up on much needed rest.



Day 3

We made an early start once again to try to avoid the morning traffic. We went to **Tiananmen Square**. But it was partially blocked off as The Party Conference was on. This is when they elected the President into office for life. Also we found out when we got home that Kim Jong Un of North Korea was also in town when we were there, which explained the heavy security presence around the Square. From there, we entered the **Forbidden City** under the watchful eye of Chairman Mao. We were struck by the vastness of this place, the very specific layout and design, all to the liking of the Emperors. We learned about the importance of colours and numbers in Chinese culture.



Day 4

St. Patrick's Day. We all dressed up in our greens and had our own parade. We were greeted with a snow blizzard at **The Lama Temple** as we asked for the gods to be kind to Ireland as they faced England in Twickenham for The Grand Slam. Next up was **The Pearl Market**, the opportunity to shop and haggle. This was the ultimate experience in shopping, bargaining for Beats, Under Armour, Leather bags, Sunglasses, Silk and many other goods. One had to be careful and wise and understand the conversion of currency. Think fast and recognise a good deal. Also you learned to walk away when the going got too tough.

Exhausted from shopping we visited an **acrobatic show**, where we witnessed amazing feats. From 16 people on one bicycle to 7 motorcycles in a sphere going every which way at speed.



Day 5

Our usual early start, heading north-west to **The Summer Palace**. The life of the emperor was certainly one of opulence. **A Kung Fu class** in the park, being watched by all the local elders was certainly entertaining. Our instructor is well known in the area and is a master in Beijing style kung fu. After our brave efforts in the martial arts, we walked across the park to **The Temple of Heaven**. This is where the emperor would make sacrifices to ensure a good harvest to help feed his people. One of the highlights was the exquisite food tasting on **Snack Alley** just off **Wangfujing Street**. Here we got to taste scorpions, starfish, snake and all sorts of other delicacies. Not everyone was a fan or daring enough to try.

Day 6

Final day in Beijing was a visit to the **Zoo** and a chance to see the famous **Pandas**. From there we went to the **Beijing City Museum** which had excellent displays of the cities ancient history. A short bus trip took us to **Beijing South Railway Station** where we boarded the night train to Shanghai. It was a 12 hour journey, four in a cabin, snug little bugs. Super in Beijing, breakfast in Shanghai.

Day 7

On arrival in Shanghai it was immediately noticeable that this was a very different type city from Beijing. This is New York style, high rise building s dominating the skyline, Shanghai Tower being the tallest. We went to the Old Town and got a glimpse of what it was like to live in a condensed space, gone were the traditional courtyards of Beijing. Here the houses were in lanes. We visited the **Yu Garden**, a piece of majestic tranquillity in a bustling city. Following lunch we ascended **The Jinmao Tower** which gave

amazing views of the city and **The Huangpu River.** A walk down **The Bund** gave a spectacular view of the business district with the famous skyline in all its glory.

Nanjing Road, one of the world's busiest shopping streets gave an insight into the hustle and bustle of daily life in a city of 24 million people



Day 8

Our final hours in Shanghai were spent shopping in the famous underground market of **Xiangyang**. He you needed a good sense of direction as well as the art of bargaining. It was an absolute maze of shops and stalls, everything available for 'best price'.

Following our last meal and probably the end of using chopsticks for some time, we headed for the **Pudong Airport** to catch our long 10 hour flight to Abu Dhabi. The 3 hours stop over was welcomed to stretch the legs before our final flight to Dublin.

It was an amazing trip to be able to do at such a young age and to gain so many wide and varied experiences along the way, was a real education.

The students who travelled would like to thank Mr. Ahearne for his time and energy in making the trip possible, Ms MacDonald and Mrs Barry who accompanied the students and the Confucius Institute in UCD for its help in organising the trip.

Ms Argue has begun preliminary work in organising a tour to China for the 2018-19 T.Y. students.

Wexford Blitz: We also sent two teams to participate in a County First Year Blitz in Ferns in October.

Juvenile Hurling: CBS, captained by Darragh Carley, commenced the South Leinster 'B' championship with an away match v FCJ Bunclody and after a tight game the home side finished stronger and won by 0-4. However, CBS bounced back in fine style with a hard-earned one point victory over Gorey CS. Abbey CC (Ferrybank) made the journey to Blackwater to play round 3 and were dispatched by 3-8 to 1-2 in a clinical display in dreadful conditions. As a result, CBS qualified for the Shield Final v Borris VC which was a bit of history as it's a long time since the school played in a final at 'B' level. However, on the day Borris proved too strong and there was disappointment for CBS despite a heroic effort from the entire panel. Rice Cup: The u-14 hurlers travelled to Kilkenny in March to take part in the prestigious Rice Cup Blitz for CBS schools. CBS lost to Kilkenny CBS and Youghal CBS before enjoying a victory

over Mullingar CBS.

Junior Hurling: After winning the Juvenile 'C' championship two years ago, CBS have been playing at 'B' level in Junior and this year the school qualified for the knock-out stages of a 'B' championship for the first time in 25 years.

We faced home games against Gorey CS (eventual Leinster champions) and Enniscorthy CBS which we lost while we picked up the points on the road v Wicklow Schools. We finished in third position in the group and this resulted in CBS travelling to Laois to take on Heywood CS in the quarter-final and unfortunately they were too strong for us.

It was another successful year for the school in both cross country and on the track and field scene. The schools athletics year began in November with the county cross country which was held at Good Counsel, New Ross. The schools cross country teams won Best School Honours at the county championships with teams across the four age groups winning medals. Tadhg Hayes, Fionn O'Callaghan, Alex Gregg and Stephen McDonnell won bronze in the minor boy's race. Jack Dempsey, Nicolai Tcaci, Andrew Moran and Chris Ryan also won a bronze medal in the junior boy's race. Darragh Collins, Conor Keane, Sean White and Rian Doyle won inter gold while Pierce McDonnell, Nathan Murphy, Alex Looney and Owen McNulty won inter bronze. The senior boys team of Aaron O'Connor, Paul Freeman, Padraic Jordan and Nathan Barron won team gold. Next up in the cross country calendar was the South Leinsters and the school had many good running performances that day with Rian Sammon, Tadgh Hayes and the inter boys team of Darragh Collins, Conor Keane, Sean White, Rian Doyle, Nathan Murphy, Alex Looney, Owen McNulty, Cormac Phillips and Pierce McDonnell qualifying for the Leinster finals in Santry. At the Leinster cross country in Santry, Conor Keane, Rian Sammon and Tadhg Hayes all finished inside the top 30 in a field of over 100 athletes.

The track and field season has proved equally successful for the school so far with the All Irelands still to come on the 2nd of June. David McDonald has won the 100m and 200m in the South Leinsters and the Leinsters. Aaron Tierney-Smith finished 4th in the Leinster 110m hurdles. Rian Sammon placed 2nd in the 1100m minor boys race in the South Leinsters. Nathan Murphy secured a silver medal in the u16 boys mile race at the South Leinsters and ran a good race at the Leinsters to finish 6th. In the field events Gergely Pap won the Shot Putt and Discus at the South Leinsters and continued that form into the Leinsters picking up silver in the Shot Putt and a bronze in the Discus at Santry stadium. Jack Forde won the Triple Jump and finished second in the High Jump at the South Leinsters and placed 3rd in both events at the Leinster finals. The All-Ireland track and field championships were held in Tullamore on the 2nd June. David McDonald was desperately unlucky to lose out in the final of the 100m on the same time as the winner of 10.52 seconds. This was an incredible performance from David and qualifies him for the world games later in the summer. He also lost out to the same runner in the 200m final, again finishing second. Two silver medals at this level is still a fantastic achievement and all in the school would like to wish David well in his future athletic career as he has been a magnificent ambassador for the school, his club and family.

CAREER GUIDANCE & COUNSELLING – Ms. Barnwell

CAO:

6th year students are now in a position to review their CAO course choices for college through utilising the CAO 'change of mind' service. This facility allows students who have applied for CAO to add to, delete or alter the order of their course preferences. Changes can be made on line and it is advisable to do this as opposed to filling out paperwork as it helps avoid any mistakes. This facility will remain open until July 1st. After this date it will not be possible to amend selections. It is vital that every student enters their selections in genuine order of preference so as to avoid disappointment when offers are released in August.

On this note, it is important to note that CAO offers will be issued in August a number of days after Leaving Certificate results have been released. Offers are usually issued at 6am on the CAO official website on the student's individual account and can be accepted online. There is usually a week's grace period within which students must decide whether they will accept the offer made. It is important to note that if a student fails to accept an offer and subsequently receives no further offers should there be a second round, they will have no entitlement to then accept the first offer. Second round offers are by no means guaranteed so it is advisable to accept first round offers. Should a second offer arise, the student may then accept it if they wish and it cancels out the first offer. If there are any queries whatsoever on this process, students & parents can contact Ms. Barnwell on <u>cbswexgc@gmail.com</u>. There is also a contact facility for CAO which can be found on their website <u>www.cao.ie</u>.

Grants:

All 6th year students have received information on how to go about applying for both fee and maintenance grants. All applications are now centralised through SUSI. Information on eligibility, income limits, candidate status etc. can be found on the official website <u>www.susi.ie</u>. A contact number for the SUSI support helpline as well as an email address for same can also be found on this website. Should parents/guardians wish to view a step by step guide on how to make a grant application, a video tutorial can be found by logging onto <u>www.youtube.com</u> and entering 'susi video' in the search bar. This will show a 15 minute clip on the stages of the application and can be extremely useful especially for first

time applicants. Various documents are needed to support the application and these are outlined in this video. Finally, applications opened at the end of April and will remain open for the summer. Applications must be made through <u>www.studentfinance.ie</u> and I would advise that they are made as soon as possible so as not to risk any delays in payment once a student has enrolled in 3rd level or further education.

Note: Grant applications may also be made for students intending on pursuing a PLC course upon leaving school.

RDS Higher Options Seminar September 2018:

Every September, The Irish Times Higher Options brings a world of study choice to students. For three days, students are offered a unique opportunity to meet directly with over 150 representatives from universities, colleges and education institutions from Ireland, the UK, Europe and beyond. Ms Barnwell will be taking students (Sixth Year 2018-19) to this event. It will provide an invaluable experience in terms of information gathering and fact-finding for students exploring their options upon leaving the CBS. There will be various talks running throughout the day on different career paths as well as stands from each institution whereby students can pose questions to the relevant people on their courses of interest.

Throughout the year it is intended to also have numerous guest speakers from numerous institutions come into the school to speak to next year's 6th year students.

On a final note, just a reminder that careers, educational, or personal counselling appointments with Ms. Barnwell are available to all students in the school at any time throughout the coming academic year. Students who need assistance in any of these 3 areas are strongly encouraged to approach the Guidance office to make an appointment. PROPOSALS FOR IMPROVING THE TRANSITION OF STUDENTS FROM SECOND LEVEL EDUCATION TO HIGHER EDUCATION

The Minister for Education and Skills has announced reforms aimed at improving the transition of students from second level education to higher education. The reform consists of four changes that **will impact on students sitting the Leaving Certificate in 2017 and beyond**. The proposed changes address the following issues:

- The extent of predictability in the Leaving Certificate examinations;
- A new grading scale for the Leaving Certificate examinations;
- Proposals towards a revised common points scale for entry into higher education; and
- Broader undergraduate entry to higher education programmes.

The proposed changes are set out in the document Supporting 'A Better Transition from Second Level to Higher Education: Implementation and Next Steps', which is available in electronic format on <u>www.transition.ie</u>. It is also available on our school website.
