SPORTING SUCCESS

Extra-curricular activities play an important part in our educational provision here. Our existing activities were further complimented this year by the setting up of swimming and cycling clubs in the school.

Well done to our star athlete David McDonald who finished 2nd in the 200m and 2nd in the long jump in the Intermediate Section of the Leinster Schools Athletics Finals recently and qualified for the All-Ireland Schools Finals on 31st May. David's performances are all the more remarkable given that he is young enough to compete in this grade next year. He has also been selected on the Irish team to compete in the upcoming Tailteann games. Well done also to Sam O'Neill who finished 2nd in the 100mhurdles in the Junior Section of the Leinster Schools Finals and also qualified for the All-Ireland Finals.

The sporting year was crowned by success on the rugby, hurling and Gaelic football fields. The Senior Rugby team won the McMullen Cup and were one match away from qualifying for the Leinster Senior Cup. This achievement was reflected in the fact that the school was awarded the 'Schools Special Merit Award' by the Leinster Branch of the IRFU at a function in the Mansion House recently. Mr Ahearne, Mr Walsh and Fr. Brian deserve special mention for their work with the team.



The Senior Hurling team won the Leinster C Senior Hurling Championship and was narrowly beaten in the All-Ireland final in this grade. The lads, under the tutelage of Mr Howlin, Fr. Brian Whelan and Willie Carley put in a great effort all year and were unlucky to fall short by two points on final day to Salesian College, Pallaskenry, Co. Limerick.



The Juvenile Gaelic Football team, under the guidance of Mr Davey and Mr Dennehy, reached the Leinster Final, only to go under by a wide margin against a very strong Granard team.

Congratulations also to Dale White (Transition Year) who won gold and bronze medals at the recent All-Ireland Kick Boxing Championships and who has been chosen to represent his country in the World Championships which will be held in Dublin in October.

LIVING FOR SPORT CHALLENGE

Well done to the twenty third year students and ten first year students who took part in the SKY SPORTS “living for sport challenge” in school recently. The school had been chosen as one of eight schools to pilot the scheme in Ireland. This program has been up and running in England for many years. The idea is that the school runs some events to encourage more participation and enjoyment in sport among young people. SKY SPORTS provide a famous sporting ambassador to guide the students through the program and provide some useful tips on the skills needed to focus and hopefully succeed in sport and life. We had Eoin Rheinish, a triple Olympic kayaker (Athens, Beijing and London), who finished fourth in the Beijing games to work with the lads. As well as picking up useful advice the lads took part in a six week program where they tried “different” activities like cross country running, volleyball, weight training and insanity circuit training. SCHOOL REDEVELOPMENT

Work is ongoing behind the scenes to advance the project. The job will go out to tender in the next few weeks and work is scheduled to begin on site in September. The initial part of the work involves construction of the new gym, computer room, storerooms and language laboratory. Work will also commence in installing temporary accommodation to facilitate the demolition of the front parts of the school to make way for the main school building. We will continue to work in the existing buildings until summer 2015.

LITERACY

We have just completed Year 1 of the school's School Improvement Plan focusing on Literacy. The SIP is available on the school's website. All parents are asked to encourage their sons to read. Thank you to all

the first year parents who returned the recent literacy survey. The feedback from parents on the various initiatives was very positive and a number of interesting suggestions offered. The continued support and co-operation of parents will be vital to their success as the school strives to further improve literacy standards in the school.

We will also be developing a School Improvement Plan focusing on Numeracy in 2014-15. A number of initiatives have already being implemented such as the Numeracy Wall and a weekly quiz.

CAREER GUIDANCE & COUNSELLING – Ms. Barnwell

CAO:

6th year students are now in a position to review their CAO course choices for college through utilising the CAO 'change of mind' service. This facility allows students who have applied for CAO to add to, delete or alter the order of their course preferences. Changes can be made on line and it is advisable to do this as opposed to filling out paperwork as it helps avoid any mistakes. This facility will remain open until July 1st. After this date it will not be possible to amend selections. It is vital that every student enters their selections in genuine order of preference so as to avoid disappointment when offers are released in August.

On this note, it is important to note that CAO offers will be issued in August a number of days after Leaving certificate results have been released. Offers are usually issued at 6am on the CAO official website on the student's individual account and can be accepted online. There is usually a week's grace period within which students must decide whether they will accept the offer made. It is important to note that if a student fails to accept an offer and subsequently receives no further offers should there be a second round, they will have no entitlement to then accept the first offer. Second round offers are by no means guaranteed so it is advisable to accept first round offers. Should a second offer arise, the student may then accept it if they wish and it cancels out the first offer. If there are any queries whatsoever on this process, students & parents can contact Ms. Barnwell on cbswexgc@gmail.com . There is also a contact facility for CAO which can be found on their website www.cao.ie .

Grants:

All 6th year students have received information on how to go about applying for both fee and maintenance grants. All applications are now centralised through SUSI. Information on eligibility, income limits, candidate status etc. can be found on the official website www.susi.ie . A contact number for the SUSI support helpline as well as an email address for same can also be found on this website. Should parents/guardians wish to view a step by step guide on how to make a grant application, a video tutorial can be found by logging onto www.youtube.com and entering 'susi video' in the search bar. This will show a 15 minute clip on the stages of the application and can be extremely useful especially for first time applicants. Various documents are needed to support the application and these are outlined in this video. Finally, applications opened on the 8th May and will remain open for the summer. Applications must be made through www.studentfinance.ie and I would advise that they are made as soon as possible so as not to risk any delays in payment once a student has enrolled in 3rd level or further education.

Note: Grant applications may also be made for students intending on pursuing a PLC course upon leaving school.

RDS Higher Options seminar September 2014:

Every September, The Irish Times Higher Options brings a world of study choice to students. For three days, students are offered a unique opportunity to meet directly with over 150 representatives from universities, colleges and education institutions from Ireland, the UK, Europe and beyond. This year, on September 17th (Wednesday) I will be taking a group of 50 students (next year's 6th years) to this great event. It will provide an invaluable experience in terms of information gathering and fact-finding for students exploring their options upon leaving the CBS. There will be various talks running throughout the day on different career paths as well as stands from each institution whereby students can pose questions to the relevant people on their courses of interest.

Throughout the year it is intended to also have numerous guest speakers from numerous institutions come into the school to speak to next year's 6th year students.
