The Meitheal programme has been running very successfully in the second level schools in County Wexford for a considerable time now. This has proven to be very effective in combating bullying in the participating schools and also provides leadership opportunities for our senior students. CUMANN ÉAMONN RÍS

The Peace and Justice Society is now in its third year. It continues to support the vision of Blessed Edmund Rice in the school and in society with a particular emphasis on social justice. The members of the society are linked closely with the SVP conference in the school and fund raise on their behalf.

The key focus of for us this year is in the promotion of awareness of the fact that more than 25 million girls around the world each year never access primary education. On a wider scale the organisation EREBB (Edmund Rice Education Beyond Borders) has come to the school for the first time. This is an international organisation linking CBS schools around the world. We have been in contact with schools from Ireland, England, U.S.A., Peru, India, South Africa and Australia. It is hoped to elect an Edmund Rice ambassador to link up with counterparts around the world to promote social justice and work together in advocacy work for the education of these 25 million.

JUNIOR CYCLE

New subject specifications have been implemented in the following subject areas: English (First Year 2014-15), Science and Business Studies (First Year 2016-17), Gaeilge, French, German and Visual Art (First year 2017-18). New subject specifications are planned for First Year 2018-19 in Maths, History, Music and Geography. The various subject specifications are also available on the jct.ie website. The focus in these documents is now very much on learner outcomes rather than content. For further information on the new JC, go to jct.ie/publications/Junior Cycle for Teachers-Parents Information Leaflet/ Primary and Post Primary. Both these documents are also available on the school website. Students who sat the Junior Certificate in 2017 will have their JCPA (Junior Cycle Profile of Achievement) issued early in 2018.

NEW LEAVING CERTIFICATE SUBJECT

The DES is planning to introduce P.E. as a Leaving Certificate subject for the first time in September 2018, firstly on a trial basis and then rolling it out as an option in all schools in 2020. We have applied to the DES be considered for inclusion as a Pilot school which would mean the subject's availability here in September 2018 if we are selected. We will not know until late January 2018 if we have been selected to take part in the Pilot.

WELLBEING

The Framework for Junior Cycle (2015) provides for a new area of learning at junior cycle called Wellbeing. Wellbeing crosses the three years of junior cycle and build on the substantial work already taking place in the school in support of students' wellbeing. This area of learning will make the school's culture and ethos and commitment to wellbeing more visible to students. It also includes learning opportunities to enhance the physical, mental, emotional and social wellbeing of students. It will enable students to build life skills and develop a strong sense of connectedness to the school and their community. The junior cycle Wellbeing programme has begun with 300 hours of timetabled engagement planned across the three years for First Years starting in 2017-18 and this will build up to 400 hours by 2020. We will be reviewing our provision for students in the coming weeks. To this end a Wellbeing committee comprising of teachers, parents and students will review policies and practices in the school in order to put a plan in place. Information will be sought from teachers, parents and students by way of online surveys as part of the process. Your cooperation and participation would be greatly appreciated.

SCHOOL RE-DEVELOPMENT

The school re-development work is almost at an end, with nearly all internal work complete. Some work remains to be done on the school wall and set down area at the front of the building and on the car park on the Bride Street side of the building. We hope to take possession of the new building after the February mid-term break. The process of moving in will pose a considerable logistical challenge. To facilitate the process while minimising loss of teaching time, I propose the following arrangements for 8th and 9th February:

First and Second Years will have no school;

Third and Sixth Years will be sitting their Mock exams;

T.Y. and Fifth Years will be helping with moving furniture and equipment.

Please note that these proposals are provisional and are subject to confirmation as the date of handover may change depending on factors beyond our control.

The CBS Primary School will then be decanting to the temporary accommodation currently being occupied by the secondary school while their school is being refurbished. The redevelopment work on the CBS Primary should take about nine months to complete. Once this is finished, the temporary accommodation will be removed from the school playing field. We hope to then to develop an all-weather pitch on the vacated property. Much fund raising will be required to fund this development.

WHOLE SCHOOL EVALUATION-MANAGEMENT, LEADERSHIP AND LEARNING

We have had a follow up inspection from the DES to examine progress on the implementation of the recommendations of the WSE-MLL- Whole School Inspection-Management, Leadership and Learning, conducted by inspectors from the Department of Education and Skills in November 2014. The inspector's verbal feedback to management on

her findings was very positive. We await the written report in the near future and look forward to its publication.

SCHOOL SELF-EVALUATION

School Self-Evaluation (Literacy, Numeracy, Teaching and Learning)

Our second three-year SSE-Literacy SIP (School Improvement Plan) is now in place and is available on the school website. Many of the initiatives undertaken are still in place such as 'Drop and Read', 'Book in the Bag' and a First Year spelling competition. First, Second and Third Year students were recently circulated with a list of reading material worth purchasing for their parents perusal. The list is also available on the school website www.wexfordcbs.ie. All First Years have been given a list of fifty commonly misspelt words from various subject areas. We will be holding a spelling competition in early 2018 among First Year classes. The best four spellers in each class will go forward to a final where a First Year champion will be crowned. The winner will get a Kindle. The reading board, where teachers and pupils post the titles of books they have recently read, is still proving very popular.

Our first three year SIP (Numeracy) has now run its course and the review process is underway. We will use the knowledge garnered over the last three years to further enhance numeracy standards in the school with a view to putting a new three SIP (Numeracy) in place.

A School Improvement Plan-Teaching and Learning (SIP) is also now in place following on from the SSE process on the same theme. It focuses on a number of areas with a view to improving the quality of teaching and learning in the school

DEBATING

Our school debating society is having a very successful and enjoyable year so far. Our Senior debate team have competed in three debates so far in the Concern competition. The lads have one more debate against St. Peter's College in January which they will need to win to progress in the competition but our young team have given a great account of themselves so far picking up points in each of their three debates concerning topics all related to the plight of the Third World. Our Junior teams this year have been fantastic in the UCD Leinster Junior Schools competition. Both of our first year teams in the competition have won debates against schools from all over Leinster. The competition works on a league format before selecting the top 32 teams to progress to the knockout phase after Christmas and it looks like two of our teams have done enough to make it to that stage. This is an incredible achievement for 1st year students as they are generally debating against 2nd and 3rd year students from all over the province so this experience will stand to them. Ronan Brennan, Darragh Sinnott, Finn Baneham and Sam Hoffheinz are members of the respective 1st year teams who are likely to progress. There is a huge interest in debating in 1st year this year and we regularly organise debates against our neighbours St. Peter's College and Presentation Wexford. This debating experience has been both enjoyable and valuable in terms of learning for all fourteen of our first year students who have taken part. Thank you to Mr Whitty, Ms Davey and Ms Henneberry who have transported the participating students to various venues across the province in the last number of weeks.

STAY STRONG WEEK

This annual event promoting positive mental health will be held from Monday 5th –Friday 9th March 2018. A number of initiatives focusing on keeping well in body and mind will be undertaken. We are currently finalising the programme.

CHILD PROTECTION

The Minister for Children and Youth Affairs has commenced the remaining provisions of the <u>Children First Act</u>, 2015 from 11 December 2017. The <u>Children First: National Guidance for the Protection and Welfare of Children 2017</u> published on 2 October 2017 also became operational on 11 December 2017.

The Children First Act, 2015 provides for a number of key child protection measures that are relevant to schools, as follows:

- A requirement on organisations provided services to children, which includes all schools, to keep children safe and to produce a Child Safeguarding Statement;
- A requirement on defined categories of persons (mandated persons), which includes registered teachers, to report child protection concerns over a defined threshold to the Child and Family Agency (Tusla);
- A requirement on mandated persons which includes registered teachers, to assist Tusla in the assessment of a child protection risk, if so requested to do so by Tusla.

The commencement of the Children First Act, 2015 and the publication of the new Children First: National Guidance for the Protection and Welfare of Children 2017 has necessitated changes to the existing Child Protection Procedures for Primary and Post-Primary Schools.

The Department of Education and Skills circular 0081/2017 (published on 11 December, 2017) informs school management authorities that new Child Protection Procedures for

<u>Primary and -Primary Schools 2017</u> have been developed and published following an extensive consultation with the education partners.

The purpose of the new procedures is to give clear direction and guidance to school authorities and to school personnel in relation to meeting the new statutory obligations under the Children First Act, 2015 and in the continued implementation within the school setting of the best practice guidance set out in the updated Children First: National Guidance for the Protection and Welfare of Children 2017.

The new Child Protection Procedures for Primary and Post-Primary Schools 2017 include-

- a) the reporting procedures to be followed by registered teachers in respect of their role as mandated persons, including a requirement to liaise with the Designated Liaison Person (DLP) and, where applicable, to submit mandated reports jointly with the DLP to Tusla
- b) guidance and direction for schools in relation to meeting their statutory obligations in relation to Child Safeguarding Statements. In that regard, the procedures require that all boards of management use templates published by the Department when preparing, publishing and reviewing their Child Safeguarding Statement.
- c) enhanced oversight measures which are aimed at ensuring full compliance by schools with the Children First Act 2015, Children First National Guidance 2017 and with the Department's requirements as set out in the procedures for schools.

All of the requirements of the Child Protection Procedures for Primary and Post-Primary Schools 2017, apart from those relating to a school's Child Safeguarding Statement, apply to all school personnel and school authorities with **effect from 11 December 2017.**

From 11 March 2018 the requirement to have a Child Safeguarding Statement replaces the previous requirement to have a child protection policy which was in place under the previous Child Protection Procedures for Primary and Post-Primary Schools published in 2011.

FIRST YEAR 2018-19

The Board of Management offered 108 places in First Year 2018-19. The demand for places greatly outstripped 108 and hence there is a substantial waiting list in place.

GERMAN SCHOOL EXCHANGE

NEW YORK EXCHANGE



Colaiste Éamonn Rís Takes a Bite Out the Big Apple

Our sixth New York exchange took place this past November with Iona Prep High School in New Rochelle, New York. Jack Cunningham, Jake Cunningham, Eoin Kehoe, Joseph Kennedy, Reece Mahon, Adam Minicucci, Cormac Sinnott, Mr. Nolan and Mrs. Hayes saw the sights and sounds of the city that never sleeps. They rested their heads in Jersey City, New Jersey for two nights and it was an ideal location as the PATH train took seven minutes to the World Trade Center. The excitement began with dinner in a restaurant with a sports jersey theme. There were jerseys hanging from the entire ceiling, yes Wexford was represented. The evening ended with bright lights, big city, seen from the top of the Empire State Building! Saturday morning began down at the 9/11 Memorial Museum. Arriving up from the subway they entered the Oculus, the new transportation hub and shopping mall and walked out to the very peaceful gardens and fountains of the Twin Towers Memorial. The museum was a very moving remembrance of the event that affected so many people across the world.

Over the next two days they visited Wall St, New York Stock Exchange, Battery Park, with a beautiful view of Lady Liberty, South Street Seaport, Brooklyn Bridge, The Intrepid- Sea, Air and Space Museum and Highline Park. They took in a Broadway show – *Charlie and the Chocolate Factory*, and stood amongst the lights of Times Square.

Sunday saw the group head up to New Rochelle and their hosts at Iona Prep. The exchange began as they went home to become part of their American families. They enjoyed four days in school attending classes and then everyone, students and teachers, took in a Rangers ice hockey game in Madison Square Garden. The week ended with a lovely service in the school chapel celebrating the two Edmund Rice schools.

CHINA TOUR

Preparations are well underway for the TransitionYear Tour to China from 10th March ⁻23rd March 2018. Thirty one students and three teachers will make the trip this year. The group will fly to Beijing and after spending some time there will then travel on to Shanghai. They will visit the Great Wall, the Forbidden City, the Temple of Heaven and the Summer Palace as well as experiencing Chinese cuisine and culture at first hand.

FIRST YEAR TOUR TO POLAND

Preparations are well advanced for the forthcoming First Year tour to Kracow from 6th February-10th February 2018.

PERCENT FOR ART

Following collaboration with the various partners within the school community a number of works have been commissioned by the Board of Management under the Percent for Art scheme. Ms Aileen Lambert is co-ordinating the Percent for Art Scheme on behalf of the Board of Management. Artist Fiona Murphy from Kells, Co. Meath has been commissioned to carry out the work and she is currently hard at work on the various strands of the project.

GAELTACHT SCHOLARSHIPS

The Board of Management and the Parents' Council are subsidising six Gaeltacht scholarships again this year to Coláiste na nOileán in Connemara. Three Second Year and three Fifth Year students will be receiving scholarships worth €700 each. For further details see the Irish subject link on the website or contact your son's Irish teacher. Given that the aural and oral components account for 50% of the Leaving Certificate Irish exam, a visit to the Gaeltacht is highly recommended to improve competency in the language.

MOCK EXAMS

While the Department of Education and Skills waive Leaving Certificate and Junior Certificate fees for medical card holders, the school will have to collect mock exam fees from all students to cover Mock Exams costs. The Leaving Certificate Mock Exams fee will be €110 this year and will be collected in advance of the exams by Ms Power. The Junior

Certificate Mock Exams fee will also be $\in 110$ this year and will be collected by Mrs Scallan on week of 22^{nd} January 2018. If you wish to pay by cheque, please make the cheque payable to C.B.S. Wexford. The Mock Exams for both Leaving Certificate and Junior Certificate students will be held from February 2^{nd} - 9^{th} 2018.

CYCLE AGAINST SUICIDE

As part of the 5 gears we are carrying out to gain once again the Cycle Against Suicide School Ambassador Award, the students of TY participated in a workshop which revolved around a film-documentary called The Mask You Live In. The film focused on young male adolescents and how masculinity impacted upon their daily lives growing up. After watching the film a worksheet and discussion forum was held within each class group where the issues that arose were analysed and commented upon.

These activities formed the ground work for the Empower Your Voice speech bubbles. Students completed these orange bubbles with words of advice or a visual image that expressed how young people can use their voice in times of struggle. Both perspectives, from looking in trying to give help and looking out trying to seek help, were captured. The speech bubbles are displayed along the corridors.

Following this 3 TY students Pedro Roche, filming and editor, Jack Byrne, interviewer and Com Barron, interviewer, organised reflection interviews with their fellow TYs. This video highlighted key learning outcomes and how the students engaged with the project. We have submitted this video to Cycle Against Suicide as a potential project for display at the annual Schools Congress in Dublin January 2018.

Well done all TYs for their engagement in this workshop on promoting positive mental health. Thanks to Mr Gannon, Ms McGrath, Ms Breen and Ms Ivers for their co-operation.

C.B.S. TALENT SHOW

WEXFORD JUNIOR COUNCIL

We are once again taking part in an initiative involving Wexford County Council and the five other secondary schools in the Wexford Borough i.e. Selskar College, St. Peter's College, Loreto, Presentation and Bridgetown V.C., aimed at promoting citizenship, raising awareness of the work of the Council, giving young people an opportunity to influence policy development at Council level. Each school elects representatives from the student body to the Junior Council, drawn from their T.Y. or Fifth Year cohorts. This year we have five representatives, two outgoing and three new members. CAO/PLCs & Careers:

All 6^{th} year students at this stage have received their CAO books as well as instructions from Ms. Barnwell on the application procedure. Further to this, a parent's information evening was held on Monday 6^{th} November, in order to assist parents and guardians in advising students on their best possible options. All students have been strongly encouraged to apply to the CAO system so as to keep their options open for the remainder of the year. In order to avail of an online reduced rate application fee of $\in 30$, students must log onto www.cao.ie and make their application before 5.15pm on January 20^{th} 2018. The fee will increase to $\in 45$

should a student choose to apply using the paper form or apply between 20th January and February 1st. Therefore all students have been encouraged to apply online. Deadlines are extremely strict and students have been warned of the pitfalls of leaving things to the last minute. Choices made at this point may be altered completely at a later date free of charge if the student wishes from May 5th right up until July 1st 2018. A most helpful website in relation to careers and course searching is www.careersportal.ie. This website also has a specific section for Parents/Guardians in relation to guiding the process of career and course choice for their child.

Should any student suffer from a disability, specific learning difficulty, ongoing illness or mental health condition of any nature, they or their parents are encouraged to speak to Ms. Barnwell. There is a supplementary access route for students in this position called the DARE scheme. Should they qualify for this scheme, they can gain access to the course of their choice on a reduced points basis. They may also be entitled to extra tuition and supports once in college. An additional route into 3rd level called the HEAR scheme is applicable to those students who are experiencing severe financial hardship in the home or who come from a family/area where college attendance is not the norm. There are certain criteria to meet for this scheme also so any student interested should consult Ms. Barnwell. Important to note is that not all colleges participate in these schemes. For example, WIT and IT Carlow have their own access routes which require filling out additional forms. Additional and comprehensive information on all of the above can be found on www.accesscollege.ie. The deadline for form submission in relation to these routes is April 1st and intention to apply for these routes must be indicated on the online CAO form by March 1st.

Open Days and Speakers:

50 students attended the Higher options conference in the RDS back in September. This was an invaluable day of information gathering. Students were able to speak to representatives of the colleges they are considering and also attended talks on various career sectors. 17 students also attended the Open day in The Solas Waterford training centre on the 22nd November. Here students were able to learn about the various apprenticeships on offer. It is proposed that we will also attend WIT Open Day on January 19th. In addition, we will stop into WCFE (Waterford centre of further education) on the way to help students learn about post leaving cert course options as an alternative to the CAO. Students will be informed on this in due course.

A list of all open days and college events can be found on www.qualifax.ie in their events calendar on the home page. Students are strongly encouraged to attend weekend events in their own time in order to help with the college decision-making process.

To date we have had speakers in from the following institutions to speak to 6^{th} years regarding potential options;

DCU, UCD, NUI Maynooth, IT Carlow, WIT and Enniscorthy Vocational College.

In the New Year, speakers from UL and Carlow College have been scheduled. There will be further speakers throughout the year and students will be updated as these talks arise. Attendance is strongly encouraged bearing in mind that their CAO choices can be changed later in the year.

Post-Leaving Certificate courses:

If you've finished your secondary education and are thinking about developing vocational or technological skills to get a job, a Post-Leaving Certificate (PLC) course could be for you. They are designed as a step towards skilled employment and so they are closely linked to industry and its needs.

PLCs are based on an integrated approach, focusing on technical knowledge, core skills and work experience.

Who are they for?

PLCs are sometimes seen as just available to school-leavers, but you can also attend as an adult participant. The courses are full-time and last for one to two years, offering a mixture of "hands-on" practical work, academic work and work experience.

They can also be a way to step into further third-level education, such as diplomas or undergraduate degrees.

Nearly half the time spent on these courses is devoted to knowledge and skill-training related to employment, with a quarter of the time spent on relevant work-based experience.

What subjects are covered?

Over 90% of PLC courses are delivered by VECs (vocational education committees). Each county or region has its own VEC and currently over 1,000 courses are on offer in some 229 centres.

A wide range of disciplines are covered including business, electronics engineering, computing, catering, sport and leisure, theatre and stage, performance art, art craft and design, equestrian studies, multi-media studies, journalism, tourism, marketing, childcare and community care, hairdressing and beauty care, applied science, horticulture etc.

Qualifications

Many of the one-year PLC courses offer <u>Further Education and Training Awards Council</u> (<u>FETAC</u>) accreditation at level 5. More advanced courses may offer FETAC level 6, which can lead to further studies at third level.

Other qualifications such as <u>City and Guilds</u> are also available. Check out the qualification attached to a particular course before you apply.

PLC Grants

A maintenance grant scheme for PLC is available. The maintenance scheme is means-tested and grants are paid along the same lines as the current third level student support scheme. Grant applications are available from local VECs.

How to apply

In general, you should have finished your secondary education and taken your Leaving Certificate examination in order to be eligible for a PLC course.

Find the course in which you're most interested and apply directly to the school or college offering that course. Because the courses are work-related, you could be called for an interview before final selection.

These interviews are often quite informal, offering you the chance to discuss your interest.

Plc courses can help students gain access to 3rd level should they be unsuccessful in doing so from their Leaving Certificate. They can also be a very strong option for students who are not yet ready to make the full transition from Secondary school to 3rd level.

** Note: PLCs have a totally independent process of application from the CAO. Should a student wish to apply for a PLC, they must make an application to the relevant college as it is not a centralised procedure. The process of gaining entry to a PLC is the need to attain at least 5 passes in the Leaving cert as well as successful completion of a short interview. Points are not required. There is a PLC section on www.careersportal.ie. The majority of PLC applications are now done online and deadlines vary from January to February.

Careers Appointments:

All 6th year students have been encouraged to schedule at least 1 careers appointment prior to the CAO deadline with the majority having done so. However there are still a very number of students I have not yet seen and so I would encourage parents/guardians to have them make an appointment immediately after the Christmas break. Any queries may be directed to Ms. Barnwell @ cbswexgc@gmail.com. Students requiring follow ups from their first meeting are also encouraged to do the same.

SUSI Grants:

All students in 6th year have the option of making a grant application to SUSI in ordering to obtain financial assistance for 3rd level. This is generally done in May and applications cannot be made prior to this. Once the latest information becomes available I will be delivering this to the various 6th year groups. In the meantime, parents/guardians may investigate the likelihood of being eligible on www.susi.ie once you log on, simply select the 'grant process' tab at the top of the homepage. In addition, you may select the 'eligibility' tab. This will help with deciding whether to apply.

3rd Year/TY Subject Choice:

Ms. Barnwell will be conducting a number of information sessions with all 3rd year and Transition year groups during February/March. The purpose of these sessions will be to inform students of their options moving forward in terms of subject choice/LCVP programme and TY programme (for 3rd years). An information night will also be held for parents/guardians of same in order to answer any queries that may arise. The new points system will also be discussed at this information evening. A comprehensive booklet will be given to each student outlining each subject's content as well as the implications of subject choices for 3rd level courses. Once all of the material has been distributed, students are welcomed to make a one-to-one appointment if needs be in order to discuss their own particular situation if they are confused as to what to choose. They will then complete a form indicating their subject choices in order of preference. This form will likely be due back prior to the Easter holidays.

TY Careers 2017/2018:

All Transition years have had a weekly class to date in careers. The main focus of the first terms was on CV and cover letter writing. All students in each of the 4 groups should now be able to produce these documents confidently.

As part of college awareness week, all TY groups had a talk from David Power WIT. David works in the IT arena and is very knowledgeable on all courses in that field, a field in which there are huge employment opportunities. In addition, 2 groups were brought up to the Wexford campus of IT Carlow in order to gain insight into life at 3rd level.

Counselling:

The counselling service within the school is an inclusive one which is available to all students. This is a private and confidential service which allows students to experience a safe place in which to discuss any issues they may be experiencing.

Sharing a problem is strongly encouraged by the guidance and counselling department so as to deal with it as quickly and effectively as possible. Simply talking and sharing can be of huge benefit to a student who is under emotional pressure. With the range of difficult issues that teenagers can face these days, it is of utmost importance that they seek help as soon as possible if they feel they are not coping well. We often think that admitting struggle is a sign of weakness, but we all struggle sometimes. We all get overwhelmed sometimes. We all need help sometimes. Acknowledging this is not a sign of weakness.

Bearing the above in mind, there are numerous ways to make an appointment with the Guidance Counsellor (Ms. Barnwell). Students may self refer by simply calling to the office and asking to schedule an appointment. They may ask a trusted teacher to organise an appointment for them if they feel reluctant/unable to do so themselves. Alternatively, parents/guardians may contact Ms. Barnwell directly via phone (school number) or email @ cbswexgc@gmail.com to discuss any concerns they may have or to arrange a meeting.

UNIFORM

School jackets are available from Mr. Hegarty. Parent(s)/guardian(s) are asked to ensure that their son(s) present themselves in school in full uniform. The school jacket is an integral part of the school uniform for all years. Those wearing non-uniform jackets will have them confiscated. Students presenting out of uniform are in breach of the school's Code of Behaviour and will have sanctions imposed, up to and including being sent home. Your help in enforcing the wearing of the uniform is greatly appreciated. Lost jackets can be retrieved from the 'Lost and Found' press. Parents and students should ensure that the student's name is marked on the jacket. Jackets are available to buy from Hore's Stores. The school has a limited supply of small and medium jackets left in stock.
