IMMERSION PROJECT

Sixteen students, Ms J. Roche, Mr. Whitty, Ms Barnwell and Mr. Joe Hore will be travelling to Kawbe in Zambia as part of our Immersion Project. All the funds raised for the Project will be used to help complete the building of the new Sables Centre which helps orphaned and vulnerable children. The Sables Centre provides food, shelter, education and counselling for these at risk children and aims to eventually integrate them into the normal education system. Whilst in Kawbe, the group will also engage in home visits, hospice visits and help in the classrooms to educate the children. The project has always been a huge success and the communities they visited have greatly appreciated their work and kindness.

The teachers and students would like to thank all those who helped or contributed to the various fundraisers held in advance of the trip. Your generosity is greatly appreciated.

STUDENTS' COUNCIL

I would like to thank the Students' Council for its contribution to school affairs during the last year. SCHOOL REDEVELOPMENT

We are awaiting the go-ahead to commence construction on the new school re-development project. Work is ongoing behind the scenes to advance the project. Work will also commence in installing temporary accommodation to facilitate the demolition of the front parts of the school to make way for the main school building.

A/LITERACY

We have just completed Year 2 of the school's School Improvement Plan focusing on Literacy. The SIP is available on the school's website. All parents are asked to encourage their sons to read. Thank you to all the first year parents who returned the recent literacy survey. The feedback from parents on the various initiatives was very positive and a number of interesting suggestions offered. Initiatives which have been put in place in the school to encourage reading among our students such as Drop Everything and Read and Book in the Bag will continue in the new school year. The continued support and co-operation of

parents will be vital to their success as the school strives to further improve literacy standards in the school.

B/NUMERACY

We have just completed Year 1 of the school's School Improvement Plan focusing on Numeracy. A number of initiatives have already being implemented such as the Numeracy Moment.

C/TEACHING AND LEARNING

2015-16 will see the SSE focus broadening further to include Teaching and Learning. As you are aware, the school received a very positive evaluation from the Department of Education Inspectorate during the recent WSE-MLL (Whole School Evaluation-Management, leadership and Learning). We are now actively working on building on the recommendations in the report to further enhance the quality of educational provision in the school.

VOLUNTARY CONTRIBUTIONS

High insurance, electricity and heating bills combined with the reduction in the capitation grant to the school over the last number of years, means that it will be harder to pay the school's bills next year. PUBLIC SPEAKING

The success of last year's Public Speaking team has inspired the growth of debating and public speaking within the school. We now have an active debating society. CYCLE AGAINST SUICIDE

As part of the Cycle Against Suicide(CAS) awareness campaign, Coláiste Éamonn Rís took part in the Clonmel to Portlaoise leg on Friday 8th May 2015. The CAS route started in Belfast, moved north west into Derry and Donegal, before making its way through the midlands and back to Dublin for the final day two weeks later. The cycling club in the school set up regular training spins on Friday afternoons and weekend spins in order to prepare the students for the 110km leg of the journey, and what a journey it

was! The day started with a motivational speech from Jim Breen in Clonmel and from there the weather was blustery and very, very wet. TEXT MESSAGING

CAREER GUIDANCE & COUNSELLING – Ms. Barnwell

CAO:

6th year students are now in a position to review their CAO course choices for college through utilising the CAO 'change of mind' service. This facility allows students who have applied for CAO to add to, delete or alter the order of their course preferences. Changes can be made on line and it is advisable to do this as opposed to filling out paperwork as it helps avoid any mistakes. This facility will remain open

until July 1st. After this date it will not be possible to amend selections. It is vital that every student enters their selections in genuine order of preference so as to avoid disappointment when offers are released in August.

On this note, it is important to note that CAO offers will be issued in August a number of days after Leaving Certificate results have been released. Offers are usually issued at 6am on the CAO official website on the student's individual account and can be accepted online. There is usually a week's grace period within which students must decide whether they will accept the offer made. It is important to note that if a student fails to accept an offer and subsequently receives no further offers should there be a second round, they will have no entitlement to then accept the first offer. Second round offers are by no means guaranteed so it is advisable to accept first round offers. Should a second offer arise, the student may then accept it if they wish and it cancels out the first offer. If there are any queries whatsoever on this process, students & parents can contact Ms. Barnwell on cbswexgc@gmail.com . There is also a contact facility for CAO which can be found on their website www.cao.ie .

Grants:

All 6th year students have received information on how to go about applying for both fee and maintenance grants. All applications are now centralised through SUSI. Information on eligibility, income limits, candidate status etc. can be found on the official website www.susi.ie . A contact number for the SUSI support helpline as well as an email address for same can also be found on this website. Should parents/guardians wish to view a step by step guide on how to make a grant application, a video tutorial can be found by logging onto www.youtube.com and entering 'susi video' in the search bar. This will show a 15 minute clip on the stages of the application and can be extremely useful especially for first time applicants. Various documents are needed to support the application and these are outlined in this video. Finally, applications opened at the end of April and will remain open for the summer. Applications must be made through www.studentfinance.ie and I would advise that they are made as soon as possible so as not to risk any delays in payment once a student has enrolled in 3rd level or further education.

Note: Grant applications may also be made for students intending on pursuing a PLC course upon leaving school.

RDS Higher Options seminar September 2015:

Every September, The Irish Times Higher Options brings a world of study choice to students. For three days, students are offered a unique opportunity to meet directly with over 150 representatives from universities, colleges and education institutions from Ireland, the UK, Europe and beyond. This year, on September 16th (Wednesday) Ms Barnwell will be taking a group of 50 students (next year's 6th years) to this great event. It will provide an invaluable experience in terms of information gathering and fact-finding for students exploring their options upon leaving the CBS. There will be various talks running

throughout the day on different career paths as well as stands from each institution whereby students can pose questions to the relevant people on their courses of interest.

Throughout the year it is intended to also have numerous guest speakers from numerous institutions come into the school to speak to next year's 6th year students.

On a final note, just a reminder that careers, educational, or personal counselling appointments with Ms. Barnwell are available to all students in the school at any time throughout the coming academic year. Students who need assistance in any of these 3 areas are strongly encouraged to approach the Guidance office to make an appointment. PROPOSALS FOR IMPROVING THE TRANSITION OF SDTUDENTS FROM SECOND LEVEL EDUCATION TO HIGHER EDUCATION

The Minister for Education and Skills has announced reforms aimed at improving the transition of students from second level education to higher education. The reform consists of four changes that **will impact on students sitting the Leaving Certificate in 2017 and beyond**. The proposed changes address the following issues:

- The extent of predictability in the Leaving Certificate examinations;
- A new grading scale for the Leaving Certificate examinations;
- Proposals towards a revised common points scale for entry into higher education; and
- Broader undergraduate entry to higher education programmes.

The proposed changes are set out in the document Supporting 'A Better Transition from Second Level to Higher Education: Implementation and Next Steps', which is available in electronic format on www.transition.ie. It is also available on our school website.

Green Schools Initiative

- We have registered our school to apply for a green flag. The Green Schools Programme is a 7 step process to a better school environment. We plan to show the benefits of undertaking this for our school. The Green schools programme aims to increase environmental awareness among the school community. It's a long term programme that aims to improve the general environment around the school and the general community. In effect we have targeted the areas of litter and waste disposal in our school. This is a huge undertaking for the school and the students with the aid of the whole staff of the school will aim to improve the situation regarding litter and waste and increase the environmental awareness of the school. So far the departing transition year group have undertaken a number of tasks in relation to the project namely:
- Putting together a Green Schools Committee
- Forming a report on the schools' current environmental condition

- Forming a plan of action

The incoming TY's will become part of the committee and look to further develop our plan by:

- Monitoring the progress
- Integrating environmental awareness into the school's curriculum
- Involving and informing as many students as possible through a day of action
- Come up with a Green Code to act as a motto for our school

We hope to be successful in our goal of attaining a green flag for our school next April. There will be a lot of work to do but with the co-operation of all in the school community and its support we are confident that we can achieve.

RESTORATIVE PRACTICES IN Coláiste Éamonn Rís

Coláiste Éamonn Rís is a Restorative school. This is an approach where our school community manages conflict, harm and tensions by repairing and building relationships.

Restorative Practices (RP) is an approach to problem solving that is based around three basic concepts-

- That when an incident (or wrongdoing) occurs, the focus is on the harm that has been done to people and relationships.
- When harm has been done, it creates obligations, liabilities and responsibilities.
- The way forward involves wrongdoers, victims and the school community in efforts to heal the harm and put things right so that all involved can move forward in a constructive way.

Traditional approach to discipline

- A violation against the rules of the school. Someone is found guilty and is punished in relation to rules and regulations i.e. What rule have you broken? What is the sanction for breaking that rule?
- Punishment alone for the offender offers little in the genuine way of accountability; does little to meet a victim's needs and does little to address the causes of the wrongdoing.

A restorative approach.....

- Demands that we think about what happens in terms of its negative impact on people and relationships i.e. Who is affected by this and how their needs might be met in the aftermath of the incident.

- Provides an insight for the offending student into the impact of his/her behaviour on others and gives an opportunity for the offending student to repair the resulting harm.
- Allows those affected to confront the offending student, to voice their feelings safely and be part of the decision making process Minimises the potential of further inappropriate behaviour.
- Involves family and significant others to increase greater accountability.
- Provides the school community with an appropriate response following disruptive and serious incidents.

Target outcomes of Restorative Practices

1. The victim is able to feel safe again.
2. The focus is on harm to people and acceptable behaviours. This reduces the likelihood of blame or denial.
3. The wrongdoer and his/her family are more likely to accept responsibility for what has happened.
4. The wrongdoer will develop a greater empathy from the conference experience and is less likely to re-offend as a result.
5. The offending student will be reintegrated into the wider school community.

SPORT

Extra-curricular activities play an important part in our educational provision here. Our existing activities were further complimented this year by the setting up of a water-polo team in the school to compliment the work of the swimming club. There was also a renewed interest in table-tennis this year with increasing numbers playing in the competitions organised by Derek Hatchell.

This year we also entered a number of First Year students into the Leinster Colleges handball championship. Glen Murphy –Butler won the 40x20 singles tile, while Richie Lawlor and Cian Kehoe won the 40x20 doubles.

The rugby and Gaelic football teams failed to qualify to the knock-out stages of the various championships, while the golf team failed narrowly to advance to the finals of the Leinster Schools Golf Championship.

The Under 15, Under 17 and Under 19 soccer teams had very successful seasons, with each team winning the Wexford/Wicklow league in the respective age-groups.

Review of 2014-15 Hurling Year

Senior:

CBS, captained by Joe Redmond, competed at Leinster 'B' level for the first time in many years and acquitted themselves quite well. Coming off the run to the All-Ireland 'C' final last year, the momentum was with the team with a sizeable amount of players still in school.

Challenge games were played against St. Martin's minors, Abbey CC (Ferrybank) and St. Peter's College before CBS travelled to play Enniscorthy CBS in Belfield in the first round. It was a game which was ultimately lost by six points (2-18 to 2-12) but it was eminently winnable and that was the most disappointing aspect of it.

Having received a walkover from Wicklow Schools CBS were effectively playing knock-out hurling when they took on Gorey CS away in late November. After a great tussle in the first half, Gorey eventually made their class tell and won by 1-20 to 1-8. Gorey narrowly lost the final after Christmas to St. Fearghal's Rathdowney.

FCJ Bunclody were CBS's opponents in round 4 at Piercestown and after a closely fought battle CBS emerged with a 3-9 to 2-9 win. CBS finished third in the group but didn't qualify for the quarter-finals.

CBS are now established at Leinster 'B' level and are looking forward to next year's championship with great relish. It's a great opportunity for the boys to test themselves against some of the best schools in the county.

Wexford CBS also contributed many players to the Wexford Schools team which competed in the Leinster 'A' championship.

Ciaran Kirwan and John Hamilton were on the Wexford minor hurling squad with Ciaran playing in all three championship games at wing-back.

CBS travelled to Carlow for a TY/5th year blitz in March which was used as preparation for the 2015-16 senior team. The lads topped their group with big wins over Carlow CBS and Patrician College (Newbridge) before enjoying a big win over St. Peter's in the quarter-final. However the run ended with defeat to Colaiste Mhuire (Johnstown) in the semi-final.

Junior:

The junior team was also in the 'B' grade but found the going tougher. After a good battle with Gorey CS which was decided by the concession of some late goals by CBS, there were further defeats to Enniscorthy CBS and FCJ Bunclody. The team was quite young and it is expected to perform much better in 2015-16.



Juvenile:

The Juvenile team lost to Ballyhale VC in the 2014-15 South Leinster 'C' final by 0-3 so were still in the lower grade this year. A great effort was put in by the squad (36 in total – there was a B team for the first time in many years) with 29 training sessions, ten games and two blitzes.

However, after an opening round victory over New Ross VC, the lads ran into eventual champions Colaiste Bhríde of Carnew and suffered a large defeat. This resulted in CBS travelling to Bridgetown for the quarter-final and the home side had too much quality for CBS and recorded a comfortable win.

CBS played in the prestigious Rice Cup competition playing games against Kilkenny CBS, Thurles CBS and Mullingar CBS. They also competed in the county schools blitz and had games against St. Peter's B, Gorey CS, Enniscorthy CBS and Bridgetown VC.

The B team played lots of games at the same time as the A team and they also played Creagh College (Gorey), Meanscoil Garman and New Ross VC in the county schools blitz.

During the year challenge games were played against Good Counsel, St. Kieran's, Gorey CS and three games against St. Peter's College. St. Peter's also defeated CBS in the quarter-final of the Marty Barrett Cup.

The internal league was won by Clare captained by Conor Graydon with Josh McMahon winning the Man of the Match award. The vast majority of the first years are underage in 2015-16 so hopes are high for a fruitful year.
